





# IMPACT 2020 RANKING 2021





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Misr International University (MIU) was ranked among the prestigous universities in the world in terms of academic performance and reputation, according to the Times Higher Education (THE) Impact Ranking.

For the third year in a row, MIU was placed in the band of 601-800. THE positions are determined according to the efforts that academic institutions exert to help achieve the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) across four key areas: research, stewardship, outreach, and education.

Thanks to the significant efforts exerted throughout the past year to serve the community and contribute to solving pressing global concerns, MIU was able to maintain its overall rank although the number of competing universities is higher this year (1406 compared to 1117 last year).

The university scored high in its contributions to SDG 12- "Responsible Consumption and Production" and SDG 6- "Clean Water and Sanitation". It also achieved high ranks in SDG 1- "No Poverty, SDG 3 -"Good Health and Wellbeing", SDG 5- "Gender Equality, SDG 11-"Sustainable Cities and Communities, SDG 16- "Peace, Justice and Strong Institutions' and SDG 17- "Partnership for the Goals".







# Introduction

Building global brand visibility was one of the main reasons why MIU submitted its data for the Times Higher Education World University Rankings two years ago. However, as we exert more and more effort to help achieve the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (UNSDGs), it has become our conviction that serving the community is not a prerequisite to score high rank, but rather a commitment without which academic institutions lose their significance.

Therefore, we now realize, more than any other time, our responsibility to contribute to achieving the UN SDGs by providing the next generation not only with the knowledge and skills they need to excel in the job market,









but also, with awareness to address sustainable development agenda. Thus, we have embedded sustainability into the university decision-making process, strategies, curricula, and activities.

During the past year and a half, the University supported various academic and community-oriented activities that covered 11 SDGs, namely SDG1, SDG3, SDG4, SDG5, SDG6, SDG8, SDG10, SDG11, SDG12, SDG16, and SDG 17.


MIU pledges to continue its relentless effort to provide quality education on par with international standards, preparing global citizens equipped with the knowledge and skills required to address community needs.


































# Evaluation of Impact Ranking of MIU 2017/2018,2018/2019 and 2019/2020


Misr International University aspires to be a fount of knowledge, science, and technology both nationally & internationally. Realizing the importance of ranking in establishing a worldwide reputation for universities, MIU administration took a decision in 2020 to submit the university portfolio to the Times Higher Education Impact Rankings. Since then, MIU has been involved in a wide spectrum of academic and non-academic activities to occupy a position among the world's reputable universities. This report underscores the university contributions to help achieve the UNSDGs and lists <u>suggestions to reach</u> a higher rank.

#### **Participating Egyptian Universities**

The number of Egyptian universities participating in THE ranking increased from 16 universities in 2017/2018 to 36 universities in 2019/2020. Figure 1 shows the number of Egyptian universities and their distribution (governmental and private) throughout three years.

### Improvement in MIU Total Score and Rank during 2017/2018, 2018/2019 & 2019/2020




Figure 2. Improvement in MIU overall score in THE Rankings 2017/2018,

MIU scored 46 out of 100 as a total score in its first participation in THE Rankings 2017/2018. The score improved by 21.1% to reach 55.7 in 2018/2019, then improved by 3.9% in 2019/2020 to reach 57.9 out of 100 (Figure 2).

The university ranked 601+ out of 768 universities in 2017/2018 rankings. This rank improved in 2018/2019 to reach 601-800 out of 1118 universities, then 601-800 out of 1406 universities in 2019/2020 (Table 1).






#### Performance of MIU in Different Goals during 2017/2018, 2018/2019 & 2019/2020

In its first participation in 2017/2018 ranking, MIU participated in seven goals that were increased to 11 goals in the next two years. Analysis of goal scores revealed an improvement in all goals except for SDG 16 (Figure 3).





Figure 4. Performance of SDG 16 during the years 2018/2019 & 2019/2020

SDG 16 was further analyzed to check indicators that caused reduction in the score (Figure 4). The analysis showed that university governance measures and working with government were the indicators that caused a decrease in the score.

#### Highest SDGs' scores during 2017/2018, 2018/2019 & 2019/2020

In 2017/2018, MIU participated with seven goals only: SDG 1, SDG 3, SDG 4, SDG 5, SDG 6, SDG 10 and SDG 17. The highest scores were obtained in SDG 3, SDG 5 and SDG 6. In 2018/2019, the number of goals increased to reach 11: SDG 1, SDG 3, SDG 4, SDG 5, SDG 6, SDG 8, SDG 10, SDG 11, SDG 12, SDG 16 and SDG 17. The highest scores were obtained in SDG 16, SDG 3 and SDG 12. The university participated in the same 11 goals in 2019/2020. The highest scores were obtained in SDG 3, SDG 12 and SDG 16 (Figure 5).

# Assessment of Improvement in Different SDGs

SDG 1 (No Poverty)




Figure 6. Performance of SDG 1 in impact rankings 2017/2018, 2018/2019 & 2019/2020

By 2019/2020, the university has improved in all the four metrics that constitute SDG 1. The increase in the total score is 32.4% from 2017/2018 to 2018/2019 and 52.3% from 2018/2019 to 2019/2020 (Figure 6).

# 2. $\frac{3 \text{ MODIFIELDERG}}{-\sqrt{2}}$ SDG 3 (Good Health and Well-Being)





Figure 7. Performance of SDG 3 in impact rankings 2017/2018, 2018/2019 & 2019/2020

In 2017/2018, MIU recorded the highest score in SDG3, the second highest in 2018/2019 and again the highest in 2019/2020. The goal consists of three metrics. The university score has increase in two of them: research and collaboration & health services. There was a decrease in the number of graduates in health. The increase in the total score is 5.6% from 2017/2018 to 2018/2019 and 6.2% from 2018/2019 to 2019/2020 (Figure 7).

# 3. SDG 4 (Quality Education)

SDG 4 consists of four metrics. The university score has increase in three of them: percentage of graduates with teaching qualities, lifelong learning measures and percentage of first-generation students. There was a decrease in the research metric. The increase in the total score is 51.1% from 2017/2018 to 2018/2019 and 29.1% from 2018/2019 to 2019/2020 (Figure 8).




Figure 9. Performance of SDG 5 in impact rankings 2017/2018, 2018/2019 & 2019/2020

SDG 5 was the second highest score achieved by the university in 2017/2018. The goal consists of six metrics. The university score has increase in three of them: research, student access measures and percentage of women progress measures. There was a decrease in the percentage of senior female academics and women receiving degrees. The university had no first-generation female students during the three years. The increase in the total score is 3.7% from 2017/2018 to 2018/2019 and 8.1% from 2018/2019 to 2019/2020 (Figure 9).

# 5. **SDG 6 (Clean Water and Sanitation)**




Figure 10. Performance of SDG 6 in impact rankings 2017/2018, 2018/2019 & 2019/2020

SDG 6 was the third highest score recorded in 2018/2019. The goal consists of five metrics. The university has improved in two of them: water usage, care and water in the community. There was a decrease in research, water consumption per person and water reuse metrics. The increase in the total score is 40.7% from 2017/2018 to 2018/2019 and 15.5% from 2018/2019 to 2019/2020 (Figure 10).

## 6. **SDG 8 (Decent Work and Economic Growth)**




Figure 11. Performance of SDG 8 in impact rankings 2018/2019 & 2019/2020

SDG 8 consists of five metrics. The university score has increase in three of them: research, employment practices and percentage secured contracts. There was a decrease in the percentage of students on work placement metric. Expenditure per employee scored zero in the two years. The improvement in the total score is 12.6% from 2018/2019 to 2019/2020 (Figure 11).

# 7. SDG 10 (Reduced Inequalities)




Figure 12. Performance of SDG 10 in impact rankings 2017/2018, 2018/2019 & 2019/2020

SDG 10 consists of six metrics. The university score has increase in four of them: first generation students, percentage of students with disabilities, percentage of staff with disabilities and measures versus discrimination. There was deterioration in research and students from developing countries metrics. The increase in the total score is 3.6% from 2017/2018 to 2018/2019 and 20.2% from 2018/2019 to 2019/2020 (Figure 12).

### **SDG 11 (Sustainable Cities and Communities)**




Figure 13. Performance of SDG 11 in impact rankings 2018/2019 & 2019/2020

SDG 11 consists of four metrics. The university score has increase in three of them: research, arts and heritage support and sustainable practices. Arts and heritage expenditures metric was zero in the two years. The increase in the total score is 83.5% from 2018/2019 to 2019/2020 (Figure 13).

### 9. SDG 12 (Responsible Consumption and Production)

SDG 12 is the third highest score recorded in 2018/2019 and second highest score in 2019/2020. The goal consists of four metrics. The university score has increase in two of them: operational measures and proportion of recycled waste. The score has remained stable in two metrics: research and sustainable report publication which scored 100 out of 100 in the two years. The increase in the total score is 9.1% from 2018/2019 to 2019/2020 (Figure 14).

#### **SDG 16 (Partnership for the Goals)**




Figure 15. Performance of SDG 16 in impact rankings 2018/2019 & 2019/2020

SDG 16 is the highest score recorded in 2018/2019 and third highest score in 2019/2020. The goal consists of four metrics. The university score has increase in one metric only: research. The score has remained stable in one metric: percentage of graduates in law and civil enforcement. There was a decrease in two metrics, university governance measures and working with the government. The total score has declined by 2% from 2018/2019 to 2019/2020 (Figure 15).

#### **SDG 17 (Partnership for the Goals)**




Figure 16. Performance of SDG 17 in impact rankings 2017/2018, 2018/2019 & 2019/2020

SDG 17 consists of four metrics. The university score has increase in two of them: relationships to support the goals and publication of SDG reports. There was a decrease in research, education for the SDGs reports metrics. The increase in the total score is 12.1% from 2018/2019 to 2019/2020 (Figure 16).

# Comparison between Improvements in Different Goals

According to the previous statistics, SDG 11 showed the highest improvement followed by SDG 1 then SDG 4. On the other hand, the score for SDG 16 decreased by 2% (Figure 17).

#### **Suggestions for improvement**

Several meetings of the University Ranking Committee resulted in the following recommendations:

- 1. Increasing number of awareness sessions about SDGs.
- 2. Performing SWOT analysis for each goal's performance to detect

points of strength, weakness, Opportunities, and threats.

3. Using SDGs' keywords in all research conducted by University staff.


- Research: the kind of knowledge created by universities to address the world's problems (research output linked to SDG topics).



### MIU Dental Clinics Complex: Free Services for All September 2020 - December 2021

The Dental Clinics Complex (DCC) at the Faculty of Oral and Dental Medicine – Misr International University (MIU) provides all dental services for free to all patients regardless of their gender, socioeconomic status, color, race, religion, or nationality. Services include medical examination, checking blood pressure, blood glucose level as well as referral for medical specialists when necessary. DCC applies all measures of prevention and control of infection according to the guidelines of the American Dental Association (ADA) and Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). Since the announcement of COVID-19 pandemic, the DCC has applied all preventive measures recommended by the World Health Organization (WHO) and other international health bodies. After the lockdown and as of September 2020 the DCC continued receiving patients under strict infection control measures.







The DCC limited the number of patients to not more than 30 new patients and 55 recurring patients per day three days a week. All preventive measures and social distancing rules were applied, and body temperature of each patient was measured before entering the university. By mid-October 2020, receiving the patients was extended to the whole week with limited number of patients per day such that the received number of patients doesn't affect the teaching and practical processes.

This report highlights the services provided for different categories of patients during the period September 2020 to December 2021.











#### 1. Distribution of patients according to geographical location,

#### frequency of visits and poverty rates:




Figure 1. Patients' distribution according to geographical locations and frequency of visits from September 2020 to December 2021

The university is settled in Qalyubia governorate; however, it serves patients from all Egyptian governorates. From September 2020 to December 2021, DCC served (9207) new patients and (39545) recurring patients as well as (22) patients from MIU staff. Those patients are from Qalyubia, Cairo, Giza, Sharqia and Dakahlia governorates. The Central Agency for Public Mobilization and Statistics (CAPMAS) in 2018 reported the poverty rates in these governorates to be 20.1, 31.1, 34, 24.3 and 15.2%, respectively. Patients from Cairo, Qalyubia and Sharqia represented the largest number of patients with high frequency of visits. This reflects the university keenness to provide free health services to community sectors with high poverty rates (Figure 1).

#### 2. Non-Egyptian patients including refugees:

The DCC offers its services to all nationalities without discrimination. However, during this reported period, there were no foreign patients. This is because access to the DCC was restricted to emergencies only due to COVID-19 Pandemic.

#### 3. Patients' distribution according to gender:




Figure 2. Patients' distribution according to gender from September 2020 to December 2021

The DCC serves patients from both genders without discrimination. The distribution is presented in (Figure 2). The male: female ratio was 1: 1.14.

#### 4. Patients' distribution according to age categories:




Figure 3. Patients' distribution according to age from September 2020 to December 2021

The DCC provides dental treatment to pediatric as well as adult patients. Distribution of patients according to age categories is presented in (Figure 3).

#### 5. Serving medically compromised patients:




Figure 4. Patients' medical condition from September 2020 to December 2021

The DCC applies Access to Care policy which states that every new patient must have medical examination in the first visit. Recurring patients are examined regularly, and medical their results are documented in the patients' medical records. Medical examination is carried out by professional teams and there is a Code Blue team for dealing with emergencies. Medical conditions of new patients from September 2020 to December 2021 are presented in (Figure 4). It is worth noting that hypertension was the most common medical condition.

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## Summary

The present section highlights the continuous efforts that the university makes towards achieving the goals set in the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and Sustainable Development Strategy (SDS): Egypt Vision 2030. The leading role taken up by MIU in this regard has been translated into a sustainable development action plan that classifies activities in four main areas: research, stewardship, outreach, and education.

Generally, there is improvement in MIU total score and rank in 2022 despite the restrictions imposed by the COVID-19 pandemic, which disrupted the educational process. This improvement is especially significant as the number of universities went up from 1118 in 2021 to 1406 in 2022. The highest scores are obtained in SDG 3, SDG 12 and SDG 16. SDG 11 shows the highest improvement followed by SDG 1 then SDG 4.

Although MIU research output is still modest, it is higher than the previous years. More SDGs-oriented studies were published thanks to an increased awareness among faculty members of the importance of the UN sustainability agenda and Egypt Vision 2030. Not having many faculties/specializations is one of the main reasons behind the limited percentage of research contributions. To encourage further research, MIU has continued its collaboration with the Egyptian Knowledge Bank, providing scholars with access to prestigious databases in various specializations, and allowing them the chance to attend workshops about academic writing tips and publishing strategies.





# Summary(Cont.)

COVID-19 lockdown had its impact on MIU stewardship and outreach. The events calendar had to be modified. Many activities were either shifted online or cancelled altogether. With the gradual ease of restrictions, community service events and visits were resumed. During the past year, increased attention was given to people with special needs in order to raise the students' awareness and interest in serving this oft-marginalized population. The university also gave special attention to mental health by organizing a series of seminars addressing different mental health disorders.

The university commitment towards the surrounding communities has necessitated keeping the doors of the Dental Clinic Complex (DCC) open despite COVID-19 outbreak. However, the service was allowed for emergencies and under strict conditions. Infection control protocol was applied to the letter, following the recommendations and guidelines of the World Health Organization. This was reflected in a zero percent infection rate.





## Summary(Cont.)

At the educational level, a number of online and on-campus conferences, seminars, and workshops were organized. Forms of collaboration with the industry continued in all faculties in order to equip the students with practical hands-on skills.

Just like all other academic institutions globally, MIU experienced challenges during the COVID-19 outbreak. However, being a policy-based institution, MIU managed to sustain its contributions to the community at large on both the academic and nonacademic levels. It is hoped that the coming years will bring along further opportunities for improvement and more considerable achievements.

The next section lists a number of recommendations and suggestions for improvement that the university intends to follow to consolidate its position and reputation internationally.





## Vecommendations and Future Plans

Believing that creating a performance improvement plan is crucial to achieve further success, MIU has always been open to new and innovative ideas that can further enhance its position as an active, community-engaged institution. Following is a number of recommendations and suggestions that are intended to be put into practice to help the university achieve its mission towards creating a sustainable world:

- 1. Organizing more workshops and lectures for the university faculty members to raise awareness about the UNSDGs.
- Updating curricula to allow for more integration of the SDGs.
   Projects and research papers conducted by the faculty members and students should be directed to serve community problems.
- 3. Performing SWOT analysis for each SDG performance to detect points of strength, weakness, opportunities, and threats.
- 4. Prioritizing research activities and using SDGs' keywords in all research conducted by university staff.



## Vecommendations and Future Plans (Cont.)

- 5. Instructing faculties to post all events and activities organized on MIU website.
- 6. Incorporating more SDGs within the University activities through holding brainstorming sessions for Faculty coordinators to discuss recommendations for ways to integrate the SDGs in various disciplines, offering innovative community services.
- 7. Engaging Staff members in the Ranking application process by discussing relevant updates during the University Council meetings and publishing such news on the MIU website.

Finally, MIU reiterates its commitment to continue its efforts to ensure that research contributions, community-oriented activities, and academic programs are all directed to prepare qualified graduates and responsible citizens who can contribute to the creation of a sustainable future.
