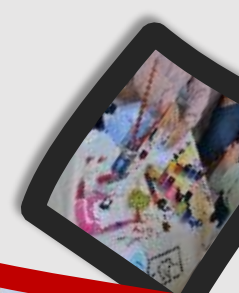

Activity (4): Ramadan Food Package Distribution and Rabies Virus Awareness Campaign – Town of Atfih, Giza

Joint Activity:

Entity Club, Move Club & Enactus

Activity Description:

A collaborative student outreach initiative focused on supporting underprivileged families, the poor, and homeless, and to develop Egyptian community. We also aim to provide a variety of free seminars and workshops for university students to help them develop their professional skills. Volunteers from MIU students participating in the activity prepared Ramadan bags to help the underprivileged families in Cairo and the Delta governorates, as MIU administration of our university approved placing two donation boxes on campus for this purpose. Student participating in the activity prepared the food bags and collected donations from their families and friends to prepare the bags and distribute them to the underprivileged families based on a preliminary case study in the targeted village.

- Assist underprivileged families in the town of Atfih with Ramadan food packages.

Activity Procedures:

- With the help of donations collected in two boxes placed on campus and from donations collected from families of MIU students, 236 Ramadan food packages were prepared (**cost per package: EGP 300**).
- Contents included: sugar, lentils, oil, 1 kg package of pasta, 1 kg of fava beans, 1 can of tomato paste, 1 kg of dates, a packet of salt, 1 kg of black-eyed peas, a pack of tea, and 1 kg of rice.
- Students bought the necessary food supplies and packed the food packages
- The university provided a bus for 50 students to distribute the packages at the village.

Event Summary:

Students gathered at the designated meeting point, in front of the main gate of Al-Ahly Club, in Nasr City at 7:00 AM and traveled to Giza. Upon arrival, they packed 236 food packages and distributed them door-to-door to underprivileged families, with guidance from local contacts. During the visit families cheerfully welcomed the students who initiated conversations with them about rabies to raise awareness about the virus. Students asked the families if they had any information about the disease. Accordingly, the families were introduced to guidelines, prepared by students of the Faculties of Dentistry and Pharmacy, about the preventive measures that should be taken to avoid infection. After delivering the aid, students returned to Cairo.

Activity Description:

A collaborative student outreach initiative focused on supporting underprivileged families, the poor, and homeless, and to develop Egyptian community. We also aim to provide a variety of free seminars and workshops for university students to help them develop their professional skills. Entity Club organized a community outreach initiative targeting the homeless population, in Nasr City, Cairo. Food aid packages containing canned and preserved food were prepared and distributed. The club members collect donations from MIU students and their families to fund and prepare these aid packages.

Objectives:

- Support the homeless population in Nasr City by conducting a thorough field assessment to locate all the homeless in the neighborhood and deliver food aid to them.
- Coverage extended to areas including Salah Salem, Tareq El-Nasr, Mostafa El-Nahas, Zakir Hussein, Al-Mithaq, El-Fangary, Abbas El-Akkad, Al-Nozha, Makram Ebeid, Child Park, Hassan Maamoun, Taqa St., El-Tabah, Ezbet El-Hagana, El Hay el

Asher, Zahraa Nasr City, Al-Waha, Al-Wafaa Wal-Amal, the cemeteries area, and other neighborhoods across Nasr City.

Event Summary:

On April 26, 2024, students gathered at 8:00 AM at the main gate of Al Ahly Club in Nasr City and boarded MIU buses, which facilitated their movement around Nasr City to search for the homeless, and distribute food bags. The club president delivered a motivational talk before the activities began. The club leaders answered all questions asked by the participants and provided assistance and guidance during the event. Students were divided into teams of four: one for taking photos, two students to search for the homeless, and one for aid delivery and engagement. Two buses were used for mobility across East and West Nasr City to maximize coverage.

Students were confronted with heartbreaking scenes. One particularly moving case involved a family of five— 2 helpless parents and three children—living in a dark spot beneath a highway bridge among stray cats and dogs. The children, aged under 15, were first spotted playing alone along a desolate highway. When approached, they stated that their family lived under the bridge. Upon visiting the site, the students met their father, "Uncle Sayed," who explained that financial

hardship and accumulated debt had left them homeless. Their pain was deepened by the imprisonment of their eldest son. The mother broke down in tears upon meeting the students.

Several other stories were encountered throughout the day: an educated homeless man, a mother with children, individuals fleeing family abuse, and others who had been neglected or driven to the streets due to inheritance disputes or trauma. Students observed that poverty was not the only driver of homelessness—family problems and emotional trauma were just as prevalent.

Activity (8): Entity Career Week

Activity Description:

A series of free professional development sessions for students from various MIU faculties. The sessions were delivered by experienced lecturers and entrepreneurs to support students in building their careers, writing their CVs, and exploring job opportunities after graduation.

Objectives:

- Guide students in shaping their career paths and understanding labor market requirements.
- Offer summer internship opportunities provided by guest speakers.

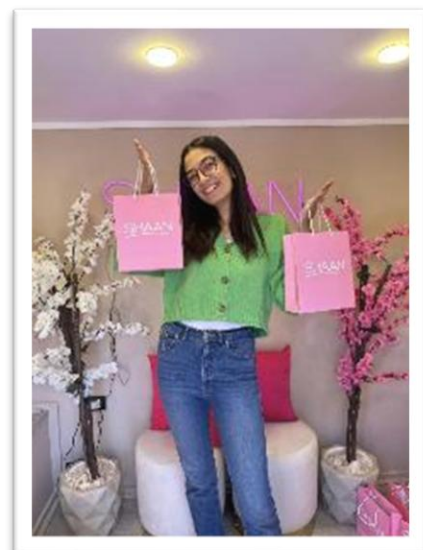
Activity (5): Promotional Campaign with Parkville Egypt

"Activity Sessions and Mock Conference for the Councils of the United Nations and the Arab League"

Activity Description:

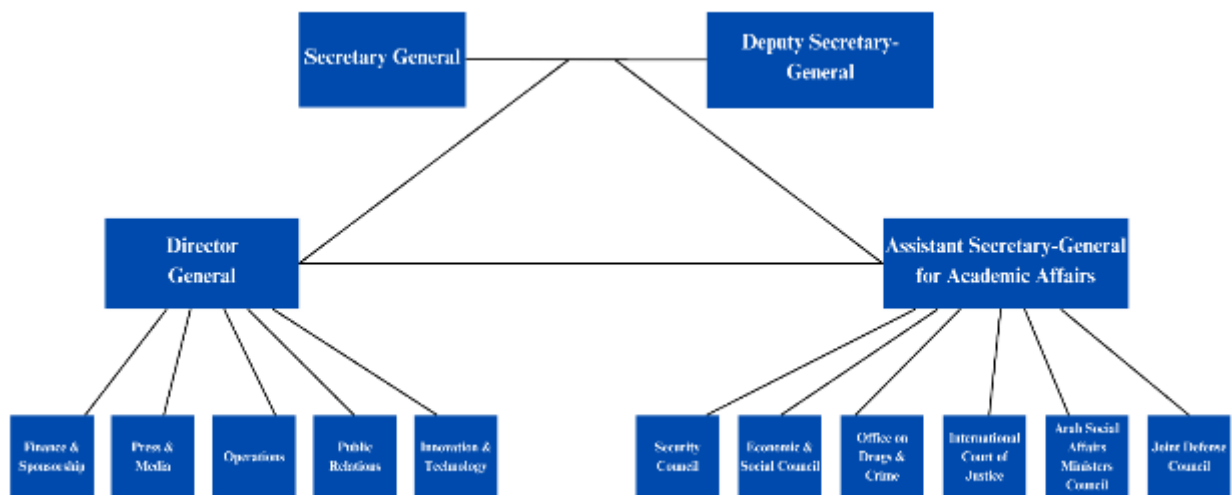
The activity sessions are interactive spaces designed to discuss and clarify the mechanisms of the United Nations and the Arab League. The goal is to provide a deeper understanding of various local and global issues and to prepare participants for the end-of-year mock conference.

The conference itself is an opportunity to apply the skills learned throughout the year, combining them with essential knowledge about both organizations. Participants will work to find innovative solutions to global and Arab world problems while adhering to the charters of the UN and the Arab League and applying the Sustainable Development Goals.

This year's model consists of six sections: four for the Model United Nations and two for the Model Arab League.

Finally, the simulation model is divided into two committees:

1. **The Academic Committee:** This committee oversees the six councils of the model.
2. **The Organizing Committee:** This committee oversees the five organizational councils of the model.

Academic Committee Session Report: Model United Nations and Arab League 2024

United Nations Security Council

Session 1

Objective: To highlight the importance of security and stability, the history and founding of the Security Council, its main duties, and its role within the UN through real-world examples.

Session Content:

1. Defining the concept of security and tracing the origins of the United Nations, with a specific focus on the Security Council.
2. Defining the Veto Power, the five countries that hold it and the reasons behind their selection.
3. Security Council resolutions and interventions in several key conflicts, including:
 - The Korean Conflict (1950-1953) and the roles of the United States, the Soviet Union, and China.
 - The Libyan events of 2011 and the council's efforts to resolve the situation.
 - Conflicts in Cyprus and Congo, including a discussion of draft resolution 143.
4. The origins of peacekeeping forces and the UN Regional Office for Central Africa.
5. An interactive activity was held to discuss the Nigerian Civil War (1967-1970) and whether the UN, specifically the Security Council, could or should have intervened to resolve the conflict.

Session 2:

Objective: To recount the history of the Cold War and explain the UN Security Council's evolving definition of war, from its founding to the present day.

Session Content:

1. A summary of the key events of World War I and World War II.
2. The story of the atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki.
3. The basic components and manufacturing process of nuclear bombs.
4. The history of Klaus Fuchs, a German physicist and spy who gave the steps for creating the atomic bomb to the Soviet Union. An interactive activity was held to debate whether Fuchs should be considered a hero or a traitor.
5. The history of the founding of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.
6. A discussion of Russian communism versus American capitalism.
7. A comparison of the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) and the Soviet Committee for State Security (KGB).
8. New types of conflicts that have emerged since the invention of the nuclear bomb, such as "space wars."

Session 3

Objective: To recount stories of illegal immigration from Latin America and Mexico into the United States via the Texas border. This will help to define illegal immigration and explain why countries consider these actions unlawful.

Session Content:

1. Defining the concept of migration and its various types.
2. Causes of Illegal Immigration between countries.
3. The state of migration in the Americas, Europe, Mexico, and Cuba.
4. A historical overview of U.S. intervention in Cuba's internal affairs.
5. Proposed mechanisms to reduce the rate of illegal immigration.
6. Interactive Activity: A mock emergency conference was simulated, including the United States, Egypt, Mexico, the United Kingdom, Iraq, Russia, and France. The goal was to find solutions to the crises caused by illegal immigration around the world. To ensure all delegates participated equally, the veto power was suspended for the major powers.

Session 4

“United Nations Security Council X United Nations Economic and Social Council”

Objective: To discuss the importance of political and economic interdependence between countries for increasing security and strengthening international relations. This will be accomplished by recounting stories of revolutions and wars across different countries and continents.

Session Content:

1. French Revolution (1789-1799), its history, causes, and economic and social consequences for Europe.
2. Opium Wars (1856-1860) between China and Europe and its social and economic impact on both sides.
3. American Revolution (1765-1783) and the history of America’s independence and its economic and social effects on society.
4. Russo-Ukrainian War (2022) and its social and economic consequences for both parties.
5. Brexit Agreement (2020) and the impact of Britain's withdrawal on its economic and social conditions.
6. A discussion of North Korea's social and economic independence from the rest of the world.

Session 5

Objective and Content: To discuss the parliamentary rules and procedures of the Model United Nations conference. The session will introduce the conference topic, assign countries to delegates for representation, and provide delegates with examples of suitable research websites to prepare their position papers.

“United Nations Economic and Social Council”

Session 1

Objective: To discuss the history of various economic systems, the evolution of currency, banking services, and the establishment of the first banks.

Session Content:

1. Defining economic systems and their different types.

2. Defining the principle of bartering as one of the first economic practices in the ancient world.
3. The materials used for trade before currency, such as shells and spices.
4. The use of metals like gold and copper to create coins and the role of goldsmiths in developing the industry.
5. The global impact of gold on the economy and its importance in banks were discussed.
6. The origins of paper currency.
7. The meaning of saving, the history of banking, different types of banks, and an explanation of the Federal Reserve System.
8. The causes of the Great Depression (1929-1939) and its impact on the social lives of nations and individuals.
9. The mutual influence of the economy and social life, and the council's role in resolving such issues.

Session 2

Objective: To discuss the origins of societies, social customs that aided their survival and growth, different types of social systems, and how societies have evolved and been impacted by inventions up to the present day.

Session Content:

1. The history, customs, and political, economic, and social systems of ancient civilizations, including Ancient Egypt, Mesopotamia, and Ancient China.
2. Ancient Roman Kingdom, its history, customs, and political, economic, and social systems.
3. Feudalism during the Middle Ages and the Renaissance, and the concept of the "Dark Ages."
4. The history, events, and consequences of the Industrial Revolution.

Session 3

Objective: To discuss the differences between various ideologies, such as communism and capitalism, and their benefits to the economic and social systems of countries throughout history.

Session Content:

1. The origins and history of capitalism.
2. The benefits of capitalism for economic systems over the centuries.
3. The disadvantages of capitalism and methods to overcome them.
4. The origins of communism and the role of Karl Marx.

Session 4

“United Nations Security Council X United Nations Economic and Social Council”

Session Objective

The goal of this session is to discuss the importance of political and economic interdependence between countries. By examining stories of revolutions and wars across different continents, participants understand how this interdependence can enhance security and strengthen international relations.

Session Content

1. The French Revolution (1789-1799), its history, causes, and lasting economic and social impact on Europe.
2. The Opium Wars (1856-1860) between China and Europe and their social and economic consequences for both sides.
3. The American Revolution (1765-1783), the history of America's independence and the revolution's economic and social effects on society.
4. The Russo-Ukrainian War (2022) and the social and economic effects of the war on both Russia and Ukraine.
5. The Brexit Agreement (2020) and the economic and social consequences of the United Kingdom's withdrawal from the European Union.
6. The social and economic independence of North Korea from the rest of the world and the effects of this isolation.

Session 5

Objective and Content:

The objective is to prepare for the Model United Nations conference. The discussion tackles the parliamentary rules and procedures followed during the event. The conference topic is introduced and countries are assigned to the delegates so they can begin their preparation. Finally, delegates are provided with examples of suitable research websites to help them draft their position papers for their assigned countries.

“International Court of Justice”

Session 1

Session Objective

The goal of this session is to provide a multifaceted understanding of the historical context, evolution, and pivotal issues of the International Court of Justice (ICJ). It also aims to foster a deeper appreciation for the ICJ's role in addressing global grievances and shaping international law.

Session Content

1. A look at life and laws in ancient civilizations before the concept of a formal justice system prevailed.
2. A look at life and laws in the period before the establishment of modern courts.
3. The reasons behind the creation of the International Court of Justice.
4. The role of the ICJ in the world and its relationship with the United Nations.
5. A look at life and law today, following the establishment of the International Court of Justice.
6. A detailed discussion of the first case brought before the ICJ: the Corfu Channel case (United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland v. Albania), 1947–1949.

Session 2

Objective:

The objective of this session is to provide a narrative-driven understanding of the fundamental differences between corruption, injustice, and justice, using individual and global examples to illustrate these concepts and discuss the International Court of Justice's (ICJ) role in combating corruption and international disputes.

Session Content:

1. Defining Corruption and its various forms.
2. Causes of corruption at both local and global levels.
3. The effects of corruption on individuals and society.
4. Global Consequences of corruption and its impact on diplomatic relations between nations.
5. The role of the International Court of Justice in resolving disputes that are rooted in various types of corruption.

Session 3

Objective:

The objective of this session is to provide an understanding of the factors that influence the formation of criminals and the laws that nations violate to commit crimes. The session also includes a debate to encourage participants to share their opinions on the discussed factors and laws.

Session Content:

1. The origins of Greek civilization and the laws that were established during that time.
2. The first criminals and villains mentioned in Greek civilization, their crimes, and the debate about whether a crime is a choice or not.
3. A continuation of the definition of individual and collective crimes, such as murder, assault, theft, drug trafficking, human trafficking, arms smuggling, cybercrimes, money laundering, and terrorism.
4. The impact of collective crimes on the political, economic, and social relations between countries.
5. Mechanisms to reduce the international crime rate from the delegates' perspectives.
6. The role of the International Court of Justice in resolving disputes caused by the various crimes mentioned throughout the session.

Session 4

“International Court of Justice X Joint Defense Council”

Session Objective

This session aims to discuss various topics, including human rights and war crimes, and how to overcome the problems they cause from the perspectives of both councils.

Session Content

1. Definition of wars, their causes, and their economic, social, and political consequences.
2. Different types of wars, using the Syrian Civil War as an example.
3. Definition of war crimes and their various forms.
4. What constitutes a cyberattack, and whether it can be classified as a war crime.
5. The origins of the concept of human rights throughout history.
6. Definition of the roles of the United Nations and the Arab League in protecting human rights and connecting the functions of the International Court of Justice with the Joint Defense Council.

Session 5

Objective and Content:

The session's aim is to prepare for the International Court of Justice simulation. The discussion covers the parliamentary rules and procedures of the court, and the selected case is presented. Delegates are assigned countries to represent as either judges or lawyers. Finally, delegates are provided with examples of suitable research websites to help them prepare their case memorandums (for lawyers) and position papers (for judges).

“United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime”

Session 1

Objective:

The session aims to provide a preliminary discussion on the office's role in fighting crime. It also indirectly links the seven deadly sins from a philosophical perspective to the fundamental factors that have led to crime throughout history.

Session Content:

1. The first sin, lust, in the context of the lust for power and control, and its connection to human trafficking and slavery throughout history.
2. The causes and consequences of the American Civil War.
3. The role of Harriet Tubman, an American abolitionist and social activist.
4. The second sin, gluttony, and tracing its evolution from food and drink to drug addiction, from ancient Mesopotamia to the present day.
5. The third sin, greed, is illustrated through the story of the Russian figure, Rasputin, and his pursuit of absolute power in ancient Russia.

Session 2

Objective:

This session continues the indirect discussion of the remaining seven deadly sins, giving delegates an opportunity to guess the main topic of the two sessions.

Session Content:

1. The fourth sin, envy, and its connection to crimes of witchcraft and sorcery.
2. The fifth sin, sloth, and its relationship to the rise of individual and collective crime rates.
3. The murder of Kitty Genovese and the origin of the term "bystander effect."
4. The sixth sin, pride, and its connection to racism, ethnic crimes, and hate crimes throughout history.
5. The seventh sin, wrath, and its relationship to impulsive crimes that destabilize societal ethics and stability.
6. The office's role in combating all types of committed crimes.

Session 3

Objective

This session aims to discuss the impact of individuals on society and, in turn, the impact of society on individuals. A debate is held on whether all criminals are victims of their circumstances or are fully responsible for their actions.

Session Content

1. Narrating the story of "The Island" (El Gezira) Film which depicts the events of the village of Nakheila and its involvement in the opium trade, to illustrate the mutual influence of individuals and society.
2. The social and economic factors that contribute to the rise of criminals.
3. The scientific and genetic reasons behind criminal behavior.
4. Various theories that support and oppose the causes of crime that were discussed.
5. Delegates are asked a philosophical question: Are humans driven by fate or free will? This opens a debate to find solutions for confronting crime and reducing the number of future criminals.

Session 4

“United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime X Arab Social Affairs Ministers Council”

Session Objective

This session aims to discuss the link between social and family issues and the rise in individual and collective crime rates, such as terrorism and addiction.

Session Content

1. Defining domestic violence, its causes, and its consequences for individuals and society.
2. The influence of family instability on the rise of drug addiction rates in recent times.
3. Defining terrorism, its origins, and how it was perceived by ancient Egyptians and Assyrians.
4. The various forms of modern terrorism and the impact of terrorist groups on economic and social life.
5. The impact of widespread violence on the upbringing of children and adolescents, referencing the Bobo doll experiment (1961-1963) to explain children's behavior.

Session 5

Objective and Content:

This session focuses on preparing for the Model United Nations conference. The discussion covers the parliamentary rules and procedures followed during the event. The conference topic is introduced and countries are assigned to the delegates so they can begin their preparation.

Finally, delegates are provided with examples of suitable research websites to help them draft their position papers for their assigned countries.

Arab League Simulations

Joint Defense Council

Session One

Objective:

To provide delegates with a foundational understanding of the Joint Defense Council and the Arab League, including their origins and purposes.

Session Content:

1. Early human civilizations and the severe lack of security in prehistoric times.
2. The Canaanite civilization – its origins, customs, traditions, and political life.
3. Exploring the concept of the “Utopia”: Is it possible to create a perfect city in reality?
4. Philosophers' views on the strengths and weaknesses of utopian societies in terms of safety, justice, and stability.
5. The history of the Arab League: how and why it was founded, and the principles it was built upon.
6. The origins and role of the Joint Defense Council, and how it has helped promote regional security and stability across the Arab world.

Session Two

Objective:

To discuss forms and mechanisms of cooperation among Arab countries throughout history, with a focus on economic, military, and security collaboration.

Session Content:

1. A historical overview of relations among Arab countries.
2. Forms of cooperation between individuals and communities in ancient times.
3. How various forms of cooperation (economic, political, social, military, etc.) expanded to inter-Arab relations.
4. Case study: The role of the Joint Defense Council in crisis response, such as its involvement during the 2023 Libya floods.

Session Three

Objective:

To deepen delegates' understanding of the different political systems in the Arab world.

Session Content:

1. The difference between democracy and dictatorship as ideologies, with real-world examples.
2. A comparison between republican and monarchical systems, with examples from Arab countries.
3. Pros and cons of the republican system.

4. Pros and cons of the monarchical system.
5. Interactive activity: Each delegate imagines running their own country, what type of political system would they choose and why?

Session Four

International Court of Justice X Joint Defense Council

Objective:

To examine complex global issues such as human rights and war crimes and explore how both institutions—ICJ and the Joint Defense Council—would address and resolve such challenges from their respective perspectives.

Session Four

Session Content:

1. What are wars? What causes them, and what are their economic, social, and political consequences?
2. Types of war, with an example: *The Syrian Civil War*.
3. What constitutes a war crime, and what are the different types?
4. What are cyberattacks? Can they be classified as war crimes?
5. The historical development of human rights as a concept.
6. The roles of the United Nations and the Arab League in protecting human rights, and how the International Court of Justice and the Joint Defense Council work together in this regard.

Session Five

Objective & Content:

An orientation session to explain the parliamentary rules and procedures for the Arab League Simulation Conference, introduce the conference theme, assign countries to delegates for representation, and provide research sources to help delegates prepare their position papers.

Council of Arab Ministers of Social Affairs

Session One

Objective:

To build understanding of human rights and refugee issues, and the Council's role in addressing them.

Content:

1. Definition of asylum, with historical examples such as the 1928 asylum of the King of Albania.
2. Social and economic challenges faced by refugees.
3. What is the UNHCR and what does it do?
4. The role of the Council of Arab Ministers in supporting Arab refugees globally.

Session Two

Objective:

To explore gender-based challenges in the Arab world and globally and discuss practical solutions.

Content:

1. Definitions and causes of conflict and war, and how concepts of justice and peace have evolved over time.
2. Definitions of justice and equality, and how their presence affects the stability and safety of individuals and societies.
3. Racial discrimination – its definition, historical background, and the impact of wars in the Arab region.
4. Early and modern feminist movements – differences and development.
5. Why are equal opportunities between genders essential for social and economic progress.
6. The role of the Council in addressing and resolving these issues.

Session Three

Objective:

To discuss the origins and roles of customs and traditions in Arab and global societies and evaluate the harms of negative practices.

Content:

1. Definition and social benefits of customs and traditions.
2. The concept of migration and how it influences or alters cultural practices.
3. The impact of migration on language and cultural identity.
4. How war affects customs and traditions.
5. A look at unique and strange traditions in the Arab world and globally.
6. A discussion with delegates on whether societies can truly function without any traditions at all.

Session Four

United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime × Council of Arab Ministers of Social Affairs

Objective:

To explore the link between social and family problems and the rising rates of individual and collective crime, including terrorism and drug addiction.

Content:

1. What is domestic violence? What causes it, and how does it impact individuals and society?
2. How family instability contributes to the rise of drug abuse.
3. The origins of terrorism, with examples from Ancient Egypt and Assyria.
4. Modern forms of terrorism, and how terrorist groups affect economic and social life.
5. The impact of violence on youth and children, including a discussion of the Bobo Doll Experiment (1961–1963) to explain learned behavior.

Session Five

Objective & Content:

Orientation on the parliamentary procedures of the Arab League Simulation, assigning countries to delegates, presenting the conference theme, and offering guidance on how to conduct research and write an effective position paper.

The caravan concluded at 5:00 PM, and we returned fulfilled by the impact we were able to make.



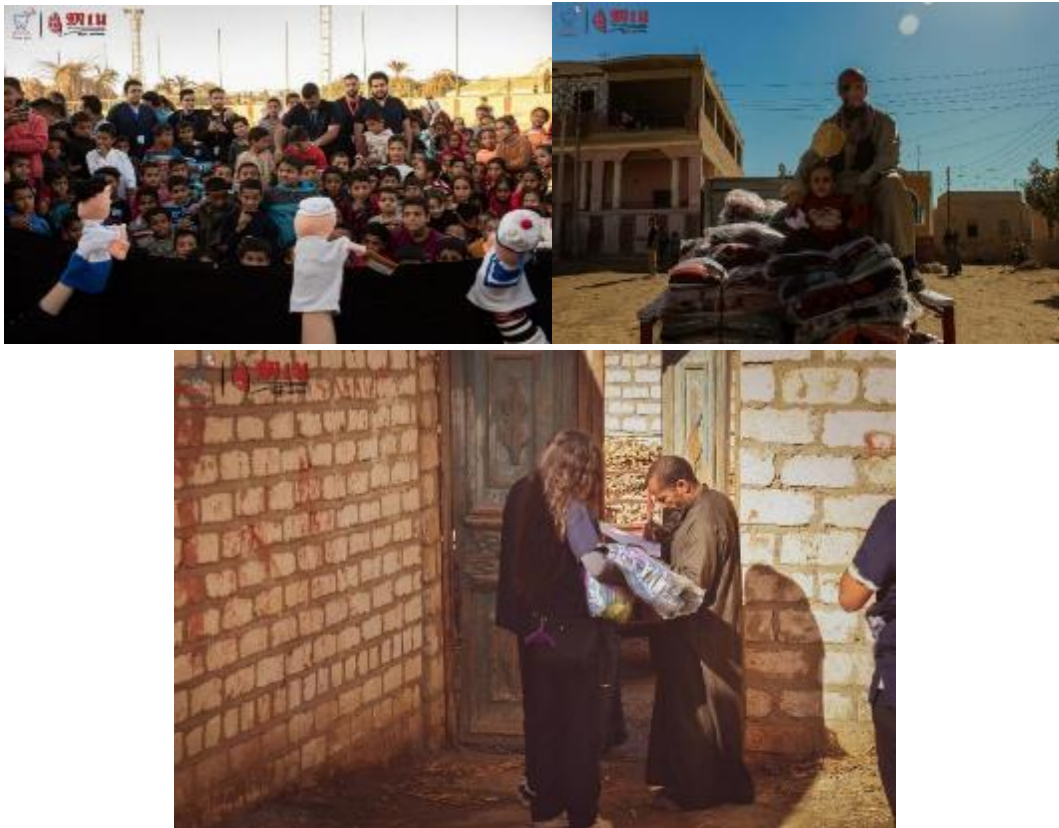

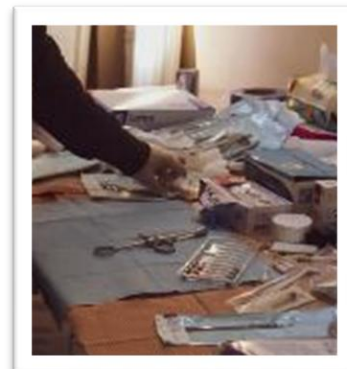
